Youth Experiences Impact Development

Every event in a child/youth's life impacts them in some form or fashion, and the
outcomes are often a result of the support (or lack thereof), they have in their present
situation, that determines their response even when the trigger(s) may not be apparent to

them or those around them.





Strong Families, Safe Kids

o Youth entering Transitional Housing Programs often arrive with baggage (literally and figuratively). It is then placed on the program to explore ways to best assist them in their current phase of life......learning how to become productive adults while also managing strongholds including, traumatic triggers, maturity, possible substance abuse, peer pressure, mental health stability, lack of familial support, etc.

Factors Contributing to Initial/ Ongoing Trauma (this is not an exhaustive list)

- Abuse- all forms
- Neglect
- Substance use- all types
- Homelessness
- Grief and loss-initial removal from biological home
- Dislocation/instability- several placement moves
- Failure of those in charge
- Peer related issues/ inappropriate peer bonding
- Domestic violence
- Incarceration
- Self-sabotage
- Acceptance socially/ familial
- Social media- bullying/ perception of self



Concerns Impacting Youth Placement in Transitional Housing Programs

- Traumatic life experiences
- Mental health conditions/ diagnosis
- Time spent away from biological family/ family support
- Time spent in STRTP/ FFA environment
 - Reasons for removal (if any)
 - Behavior management during placement
 - Exposure to other behaviors
- Historical/ current support
- Youth's lack of resilience
- Youth's motivational level
- Youth's ability to process, acknowledge responsibility/ accountability
- Current law enforcement involvement



How THP Placements Provide Support Towards Mental Stability and Progress

• THP provides opportunities for youth to slowly, but progressively, exit out of survivor mode, while attempting to prepare them for independence and adulthood. Below are strategic implementations to assist youth 18-21 years of age as they move through our Transitional in the contraction.

Housing Placement Program:

- Provide weekly support for youth
- Assist them in focusing on stability
- Structure- new ways of managing stability
- Conflict resolutions skills- to address peer/ authority concerns
- Communication skills- learning/using adaptive communication appropriately
- Referral to mental health services/ substance abuse services
- Independent Living Skills
- Assist in learned resiliency- Awareness of ability to exit "survival mode" thinking

CA Foster Youth Data

Foster Youth are suspended/excluded from high school at nearly three times the rate of non-foster students

Only 54 percent of foster youth students complete high school in four years, compared to 83 percent of the general student population

85% of foster youth apply to a California Community College, but only about 50% actually enroll

Average GPA for foster youth in first year of college is 25 percent lower and they earn one-third fewer credits than non-foster peers


Develop and maintain a regional framework that supports inter-agency collaboration for foster youth

Foster Youth Dual Enrollment Project Riverside City College

Students take a college course while in high school

Earn high school and college credit simultaneously

Open to foster youth in Alvord, Jurupa, and Riverside USD

Assistance with approval forms and enrollment

Weekly progress check-in's

\$300 stipend for every dual enrollment class successfully completed

FYSN Impact (2018-2021)

5,317 services to 1,131 foster youth (grades 9-12)

494 foster youth from service area registered in RCCD

400 foster youth from outside service area registered in RCCD

Phoenix Scholars/Next Up - Norco College



Norco College's Phoenix Scholars program creates a welcoming and supportive environment for current and former foster youth. Our goal is to empower students to reach their full potential to achieve academic, personal and career goals. Phoenix Scholars promotes self-advocacy by establishing meaningful connections and a support network within the Norco College campus community.

Program Eligibility

- o Complete the Phoenix Scholars program application
- Must provide court dependency letter with at least one day of fo from 0-18 years old (e.g. foster home, group home, or placed with court)
- Complete FAFSA/DREAM application
- Meet the requirements to be eligible for EOPS





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Services

Professional staff and peer mentors, in partnership with a variety of on-campus departments and external agencies, work to meet our students academic and personal needs. We offer:

- O Counseling Services (Academic, Personal, and Career counseling)
- Financial Aid Priority Processing (FAFSA application assistance, grants and scholarships)
- Funds to buy required textbooks
- Semester meal card/grocery card
- Transportation assistance (Gas Card)
- O College Transfer Assistance (transfer counseling services, college tours, refer
